

DEPARTMENT 14 – PLANT AND SOIL SCIENCE

Exhibits may be brought in Wednesday between 10 AM and noon which may help them be more fresh for judging. Exhibits may also be brought in on Tuesday between noon and 6 PM.

All grain, grass, vegetables, fruits, and other exhibits must be removed between 5 and 6 PM on Sunday or the fair will dispose of the exhibits.

In case there is but one entry under any lot number, judges may award any or no premium according to the merit of exhibit on display.

No exhibitor will be paid more than one premium under any one lot number. Any exhibit entered under "Any other variety" must bear on the tag the name of the variety by which the exhibitor knows it. For instance, under "Any other recognized standard variety of merit" of potatoes, do not put on the tag "Any other variety" but the name by which you know the potato.

All exhibits in this department must be exhibited in the name of the grower. Any exhibitor entering any exhibit in this department purchased or otherwise secured will forfeit any premium earned in this or any other department.

All samples must be from the current year or last year's crop. The judges will disqualify older exhibits. The fair accords the superintendent of this department the right to refuse to accept samples, which are not properly prepared or are unworthy of showing.

CLASS D – SHEAF GRAINS, GRASSES, AND CORN

Sheaves and bundles must be made three inches in diameter at the center bands. Sheaf grains should show nice clean straw, well filled, and well-formed heads. The heads should be placed uniformly and the samples should have the outside stems stripped of their leaves and tied neatly.

All sheaves put up for hay should not be stripped, the leaves however should be free from rust as far as possible and the hay cured in as natural a green condition as possible. The stems of good quality hay are fine and in making up the bundles see that the heads are put uniformly and the bottoms of bundles are cut off evenly and attractively.
